WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT SUCCESS STORY:


Gary came to us in May 2019 wanting to find more suitable employment. Underemployed in a low-paying position of housekeeping and sanitation in a production facility, Gary didn't feel appreciated and saw no chance for advancement.

Counseling and assessment clarified Gary's skills and identified what could be rewarding work. He developed an online-compatible resume, prepared for interviews and did internet searches with local companies. Gary focused on a maintenance position with Knoxville's Community Development Corporation (KCDC), but he did not get the job after interviewing and was very disappointed, so our counselors identified areas of improvement. In October, the position was posted again, Gary submitted his application and interviewed again. He received a job offer with better pay, full benefits package and an environment that suited him much better.

Gary said: "I'm having a lot of fun. I'm learning new things. This is a really good job. I got my uniform. I got a company phone, so everything is good right now. Thank you for your help!"

WORKFORCE **DEVELOPMENT**

THE ISSUE:

In a tight job market, there are greater employment needs among a broader, more diverse sector of our community.

IMPACT AND OUTCOMES

- 310 individuals served through workforce program.
- 125 clients received one-on-one career counseling and coaching sessions.
- 185 increased employability through individual and group instruction, lunch and learn sessions, career readiness workshops and computer training.
- 203 clients updated resumes and received job search tools and assistance with online employment applications.
- 105 clients gained employment.

WORKFORCE DEPARTMENT

We provide assistance to

unemployed and under-employed individuals ages 16 years or older. We help those with limited skills and education, as well as those who have degrees and skills, to increase their career opportunities and income level. We provide job counseling and coaching, resume writing assistance, mock interviews and techniques, certifications, job readiness workshops integrated case management, and financial literacy classes. We also offer computer classes, hiring events and career fairs.

THE ISSUE:

Today's student needs out-ofschool support and a wide range of competencies to succeed. For Tennessee to reach its goal of preparing all students for success in college and career and increasing the overall number of students with college degrees, education partners must place priority on supporting academic growth for students of color and students living in poverty.

IMPACT AND OUTCOMES

- 153 scholars inducted into the National Achievers Society.
- 60 senior scholars graduated, and 98% enrolled in degree-granting postsecondary institutions.
- Knoxville Area Urban League's National Achievers Society placed

second in 2019 National Urban League Youth Leadership Summit's Case Competition.

NATIONAL ACHIEVERS SOCIETY

National Achievers Society (NAS) empowers today's youth to become tomorrow's leaders by celebrating academic achievement and professional and personal development and raising social awareness and the level of consciousness to make responsible and well-informed decisions for life. The National Achievers Society is open to students of color throughout Knoxville and surrounding areas (including Anderson and Blount counties) in grades 10-12 with a 3.0 or higher cumulative grade point average. Scholars participate in programs throughout the school year that promote the importance of academics, cultural enrichment, service learning and college and career readiness.

SHOES FOR SCHOOL

Shoes for School, a mammoth undertaking that gets bigger each year, provides new shoes and school supplies to about 5,000 area kids who are most in need. The carnival-like atmosphere included more than 40 booth sponsors and hundreds of volunteers who provide games, food and school supplies to the children.

- 1,400 pairs of new shoes distributed to area elementary school students.
- 600 backpacks distributed to middle school students.
- Thousands of school supplies distributed through community partners and corporate sponsors.

ECONOMIC AND BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

THE ISSUE:

While more individuals are starting businesses, others are struggling to keep their small businesses afloat. Minorityowned businesses are less likely to receive loans than non-minority-owned businesses and when awarded. loans are at lesser amounts.

IMPACT AND OUTCOMES

• 156 individuals served through economic and business development programs.

- 77 individuals attended workshops and seminars.
- 51 individuals received 1-to-1 technical assistance.
- 20 individuals received 20 weeks of entrepreneurship training.
- Loans totaled \$170,000.
- \$5.2 million loan portfolio managed.

EMPOWERMENT OPPORTUNITY LOAN PROGRAM

As a Certified Community **Development Financial Institution** the Knoxville Area Urban League provides access to capital, entrepreneurship training and 1-to-1 technical assistance to entrepreneurs starting or growing a business. We make loans to businesses that cannot qualify for traditional bank loans. The primary focus is building the capacity of entrepreneurs and businesses to provide jobs, goods and services in low-income and economically distressed communities.

ENTREPRENEURSHIP TRAINING The CO.STARTERS Program equips

entrepreneurs with the tools and resources needed to start and grow their business. Our program makes business concepts and language easy to understand, so entrepreneurs can focus on the practical steps necessary to launch their business. During this 10-week program, participants cover everything from identifying customers and their needs to creating a marketing message and plan to setting prices and finding funding. We also connect participants with mentors, experts and other local entrepreneurs through interactive discussions, lessons and case studies.

GrowthWheel is our visual toolbox and cloud-based platform used by our certified business advisors

to help entrepreneurs and growth companies make decisions and take action. GrowthWheel is a coaching and advising tool to help clients start, build and grow their companies. We help entrepreneurs see their business from a 360-degree perspective so they can get focused on what matters now and next.

HOUSING AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

THE ISSUE:

Once considered a problem of the poor, housing issues now confront people at every income level. Homeownership is still the American dream.

IMPACT AND OUTCOMES

- 302 clients served overall.
- 120 clients completed homebuyer education course.
- 75 clients completed financial education.
- 27 clients received counseling to address, resolve or prevent foreclosure.
- 115 clients purchased homes with total economic impact of \$17,825,000.

HOUSING COUNSELING

In 2019, our Housing Counselor helped improve access to safe and affordable housing. Direct service providers engage clients in goalsetting, budgeting, credit building, helping negotiate terms with agents and identifying emergency and financial assistance. As an affiliate of the National Urban League, we tailor our services to

our community and work with a diverse group of public and private organizations to increase impact.

FORECLOSURE PREVENTION

We help distressed homeowners understand, evaluate and navigate a financial crisis by providing specific action steps and, when possible, helping them avoid foreclosure by negotiating an affordable loan modification or terms of forbearance.

FINANCIAL CAPACITY BUILDING

A comprehensive bundled service delivery approach integrates career development with income supporters and financial coaching to help adults and families build the financial capability needed to reach financial stability and upward mobility. As an agency, we focus on empowering people to earn more, to manage and retain more of what they earn, to reduce debt, enhance credit scores, increase savings and build assets.
